Daytona Beach, FL (April xx, 2015) - In celebration of the launch of the new 2015 hard cover book, Cuba: A History in Art, the Museum of Arts & Sciences (MOAS) will host an educational day with a spotlight on Cuban art and history on Wednesday, May 13, 2015. The Museum will be joined by Gary R. Libby, director emeritus of the Museum of Arts & Sciences and author of Cuba: A History in Art, for an afternoon cultural program that will take place from 3:00 p.m. until 4:00 p.m. in the Root Auditorium. Those in attendance will be treated to a brief illustrated intro to the book as well as the Batista family and their connection to Daytona Beach. There will also be an opportunity for a Q&A session. A book signing in Root Hall will follow the presentation. Admittance to this program is free for MOAS Members or is included with general museum admission.

The revised edition of Cuba: A History in Art, published by the University Press of Florida, features essays by renowned art historians, Gary Libby and Juan Martinez that provide a historical, social and cultural overview of Cuban art, featuring paintings from the Cuban Foundation Museum at MOAS. The original edition was published in 1997.

About the Author

Gary R. Libby is a member of the Cuban Foundation and director emeritus of the Museum of Arts & Sciences in Daytona Beach, Florida where he served as director for 27 years. He is a former assistant professor in art history at Stetson University and received his undergraduate degrees from the University of Florida and graduate degrees from Tulane University in New Orleans and the University of Florida. Libby is past president of the Florida Art Museum Directors Association (FAMDA) and former Secretary of the Florida Association of Museums (FAM) who gave him their Lifetime Achievement Award in 1998. His other books include Two Centuries of Cuban Art: 1759-1959, Reflections: Paintings of Florida 1865-1965 and Reflections II: Watercolors of Florida 1835-2000.

About the Cuban Foundation Museum

The Cuban Foundation Museum, located at the Museum of Arts & Sciences, is home to one of the most important collections of Cuban fine and folk art outside of Cuba. The collection chronicles 300 years of Cuban history and art in more than 200 objects. Museum of Arts & Sciences admission includes one Planetarium show. Cici and Hyatt Brown Museum of Art admission is \$10.95 adults; \$4.95 children 6-17; \$8.95 seniors and students; members and children 5 and under are free. Combo ticket admission is \$18.95 adults; \$9.95 children 6-17; \$16.95 seniors and students; members and children 5 and under are free. Combo ticket admission includes on Planetarium show. Additional Planetarium shows are \$5.00 for adults and \$3.00 for children ages 17 and under. Parking is free. Admission is FREE for Volusia County residents the first Tuesday of each month (does not include Planetarium shows). MOAS is fully accessible to the handicapped. MOAS is located at 352 S.
